### Letter of Motivation

Enclosed please find my application for the Accountability and Transparency Review Team 2 (ATRT 2). In particular, I am proposing to serve as a representative of the Generic Names Supporting Organization (GNSO).

In the Affirmation of Commitments, ICANN affirmed that it would, "maintain and improve robust mechanisms for public input, accountability, and transparency so as to ensure that the outcomes of its decision-making will reflect the public interest and be accountable to all stakeholders." Given the significance of ICANN's global role as well as the changing Internet governance landscape, I feel that accountability and transparency should be an exceptionally high priority. In particular, as demonstrated by process accompanying the recent revision of the International Telecommunication Regulations, ICANN needs to become more accountable and accessible to all members of the global Internet community and demonstrate that ICANN embraces international perspectives.

Serving on the ATRT 2 is important to me for both personally and professionally. I have had the pleasure of being a part of the ICANN community for over five years now and I firmly believe in ICANN as the model of a multi-stakeholder, private sector-led, bottom-up organization. I have spent the majority of these past five years supporting the multistakeholder model during both my previous job at Booz Allen Hamilton and continue to do so now at Google. Due to my extensive work in this space, I was recently appointed as a subject-matter expert to the U.S. Delegation to the WCIT, and have actively participated in the activities of the Internet Governance Forum (IGF) and within the UN more broadly. My work has also focused on promoting the multistakeholder model externally in many ways, for example, by co-producing a video that demonstrates ICANN's international character and helping to promote ICANN's work as a bottom-up organization, which is open to all.

In my five years participating in ICANN, I have done so in a variety of roles from tracking work within the GAC to supporting Google as a new gTLD applicant. I believe that my contributions are well respected within the community and I bring a nuanced approach to both ICANN and the broader Internet governance landscape. I am lucky because my personal interests line up well with the interests of my current employer, Google. Although Google is an applicant for several gTLDs, it is the company's core philosophy to promote a culture of transparency and accountability. For example, Google's Transparency Report has helped bring clarity to takedown requests for content on the global Internet, and it has also helped provide visibility into government takedown requests. In a similar way, Google is committed to preserving ICANN by ensuring its transparency and credibility worldwide. In particular, I believe that the work of ATRT 2 needs to be more inclusive of international perspectives and I would like to help advance that work.
