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Welcome to ICANN84 from the GNSO Chairs



The Generic Names Supporting Organization (GNSO) Council and the GNSO community welcome your participation in the ICANN84 Annual General Meeting in Dublin. As with all ICANN Public Meetings, at ICANN84, the GNSO will seek to equally leverage contributions of in-person and remote participants to advance important policy development efforts and the work of the GNSO Council. As ICANN84 approaches, we would like to highlight a few GNSO initiatives that will be on the agenda for the meeting, as well as recent and ongoing work that may interest you. Additional information about GNSO projects can be found in the following sections of this document.



During ICANN84, the GNSO plans to progress key policy development initiatives and other GNSO projects.

The Policy Development Process (PDP) Working Group on Latin Diacritics has been making progress on its investigation of the circumstance where a base American Standard Code for Information Interchange (ASCII) generic top-level domain (gTLD) and the Latin script diacritic version of the gTLD are NOT variants of each other and determine what mechanism is needed to allow a single registry operator to simultaneously operate both gTLDs. The Latin Diacritics Working Group will hold two meetings during ICANN84, where it will continue working to finalize its preliminary recommendations in preparation for publishing its Initial Report.

The GNSO Council's Standing Committee on the Registration Data Request System (RDRS) will hold four (4) open meetings during ICANN84. It will continue reviewing the Public Comments received on its Finding Report, which summarizes the trends it has identified, system improvements that have been implemented since the RDRS began operating, and lessons learned during the pilot period. Following its comprehensive review of the Public Comments, the RDRS Standing Committee will update its Finding Report and transmit the report to the GNSO Council for its consideration.

We also wanted to note that the Public Comment period on the Preliminary Issue Report on a Policy Development Process on Domain Name System (DNS) Abuse recently closed. There will be a dedicated GNSO session on the topic of DNS Abuse on Saturday, 18 October.

During ICANN84, the GNSO Council will hold the following meetings: on Sunday, 26 October, the Council will hold two public working sessions and a bilateral meeting with the Governmental Advisory Committee (GAC); on Monday, 27 October, the Council will meet with the ICANN Board; on Wednesday, 29 October, the Council will hold its public meeting; and, on Thursday, 30 October, the Council will hold its wrap-up session.

ICANN84 will be a full meeting with ample opportunities to participate and learn about GNSO policy development. Whether you are attending in person in Dublin, or via Zoom, we look forward to seeing you soon. We wish you all a productive meeting.

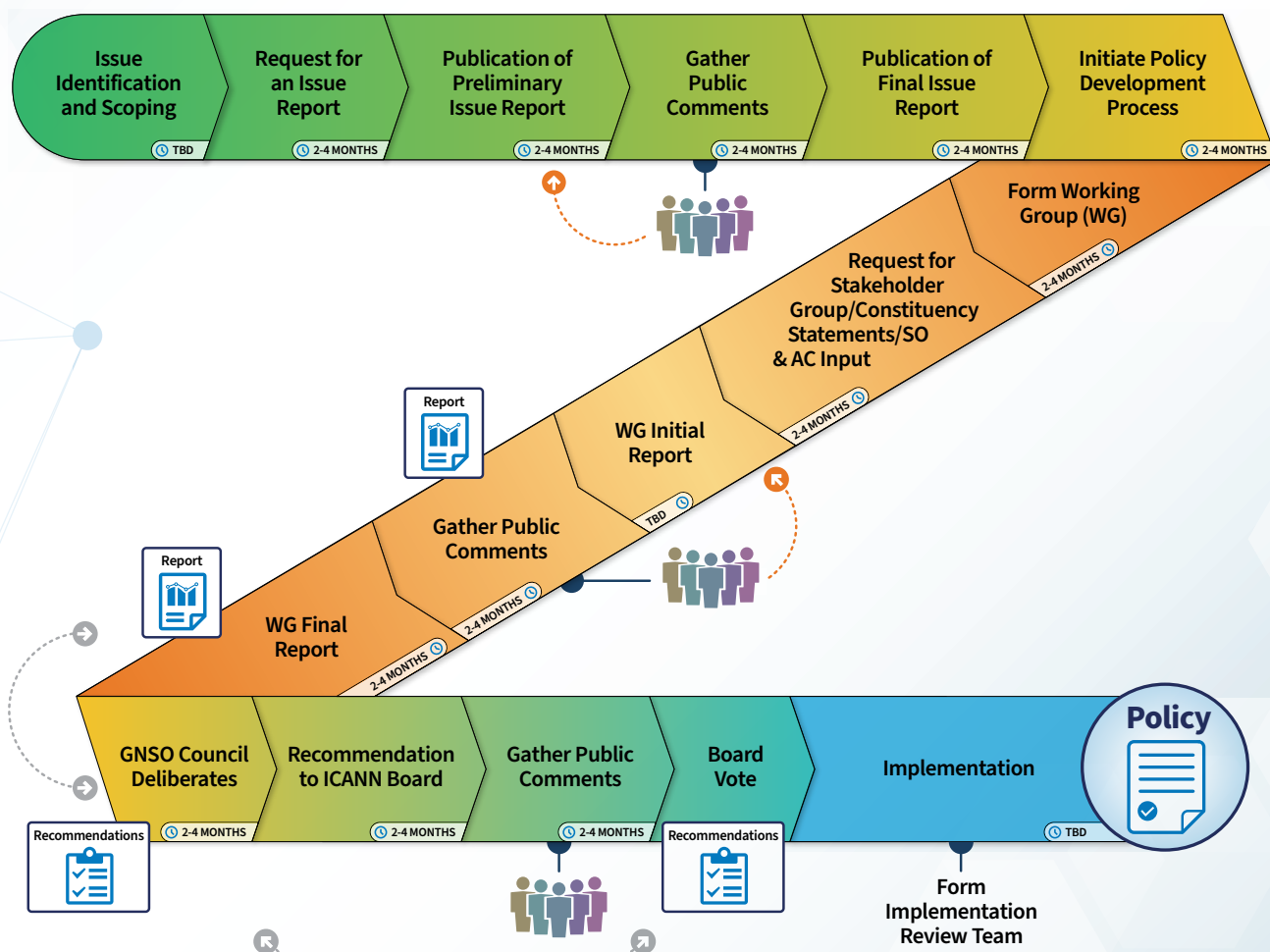

GNSO Policy Development Process Infographic

The GNSO Policy Development Process (PDP) governs how the GNSO develops consensus policies related to generic top-level domains (gTLDs). As shown in the summarized graph below, a GNSO PDP lifecycle consists of different steps. They include issue identification and scoping, PDP initiation, working group, GNSO Council deliberation, ICANN Board vote, and policy implementation.



The respective steps reached by the PDP working groups are detailed in the following sections.

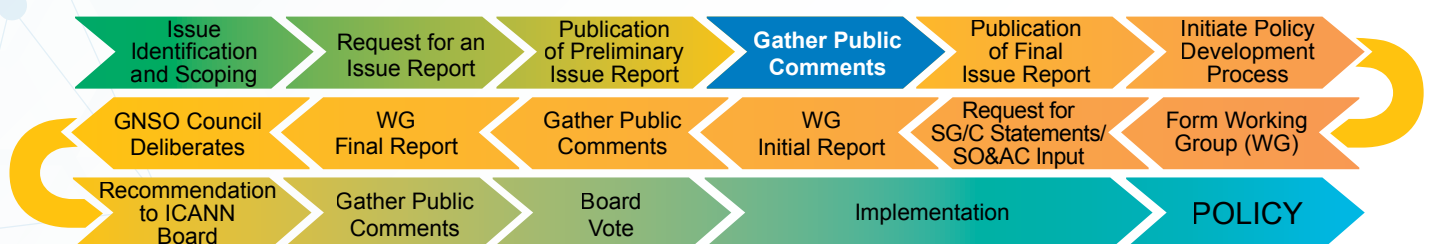
Preliminary Issue Report: DNS Abuse

WHAT CAN I EXPECT AT ICANN84 RELATED TO THIS TOPIC?

The GNSO Council **requested** an Issue Report on DNS Abuse in August 2025 and in doing so, suggested three (3) priority topics that should be included in the Policy Development Process (PDP) on DNS Abuse that is expected to follow the completion of the Final Issue Report. The DNS Abuse Small Team, in alignment with community support, **recommended** a narrowly scoped PDP on three issues. While staff found all three issues to be within the remit of GNSO policy development, and two meriting prompt attention through initiating a PDP, one of the priority issues could be implemented outside the contractual requirements. Therefore, staff recommended initiating a PDP that is limited, at this stage, to focusing on only two issues: 1) Unrestricted Application Programming Interface (API) access for high-volume registration and 2) Associated Domain Checks. In its session scheduled at ICANN84 the goal is to begin preparations for the anticipated PDP by discussing the two priority topics, gaining an initial understanding of the various goals and interests across the community. This preparatory work is expected to provide the eventual PDP on DNS Abuse with a starting basis to conduct its deliberations. The session is scheduled to take place on Sunday, 26 October from 10:30 to 12:00 Dublin local time, but please verify the **ICANN84 meeting schedule** for the confirmed time.

WHAT IS THIS ABOUT?

In early 2025, the GNSO Council reconvened its DNS Abuse Small Team with a revised assignment form to re-examine DNS Abuse mitigation considering new developments, research, and data. The previous Small Team (2021–2022) had identified obligation gaps and issued recommendations, some of which were addressed through contractual amendments to the Registry Agreement (RA) and Registrar Accreditation Agreement (RAA). Those amendments (effective since April 2024) strengthened abuse mitigation obligations, and ICANN Contractual Compliance has since reported initial data on their impact. With these measures in place and new research available, the Small Team was tasked to consider new insights and discuss potential next steps on DNS Abuse. Drawing from community input, compliance data,



and external studies, the team was charged with identifying remaining gaps and assessing whether further policy development is warranted.

The DNS Abuse Small Team conducted a review of data and source documents noted in their assignment form, focusing on identifying potential gaps in DNS Abuse mitigation efforts across multiple phases of the DNS Abuse lifecycle (as proposed by the Small Team in 2022). The Small Team compiled a matrix of DNS Abuse “gaps,” noting areas where abuse prevention, reporting, response, or obligations could be strengthened after further investigating the identified gaps. Findings were categorized by thematic clusters to support potential prioritization and future policy scoping.

The DNS Abuse Small Team delivered its [report](#) to Council in August 2025, who voted on it on 14 August. One of the recommendations was to initiate an Issue Report to further discuss the identified gaps and propose issues for a narrowly scoped PDP. The [Preliminary Issue Report](#) was published on 8 September 2025.

WHAT IS THE CURRENT STATUS OF THIS PROJECT?

The [Preliminary Issue Report](#) includes a draft PDP charter which focuses on two priority issues of the more expansive full list of issues reviewed in the Issue Report. The intention here is to allow for a narrowly targeted PDP to reach rapid outcomes on particularly impactful issues, and where there is broad community agreement that the issue should be addressed. The GNSO, in anticipation of this narrow PDP, is soliciting feedback during a working session at ICANN84 to help establish a starting basis for the eventual PDP.

WHAT ARE THE EXPECTED NEXT STEPS?

ICANN org staff is seeking [Public Comment](#) input on the Preliminary Issue Report on a PDP on DNS Abuse Mitigation. Feedback received will inform the Final Issue Report that the GNSO Council will consider in determining next steps, which could include the initiation of a PDP. The working session during ICANN84 will begin preparations for the anticipated PDP by discussing the two priority topics and gaining an initial understanding of the various goals and interests across the community for each.

HOW CAN I GET INVOLVED?

ICANN org staff is seeking [Public Comment](#) input on the Preliminary Issue Report on a PDP on DNS Abuse Mitigation. Feedback received will inform the Final Issue Report that the GNSO Council will consider in determining next steps, which could include the initiation of a PDP. Policy Development Process: Latin Script Diacritics

WHAT CAN I EXPECT AT ICANN84 RELATED TO THIS TOPIC?

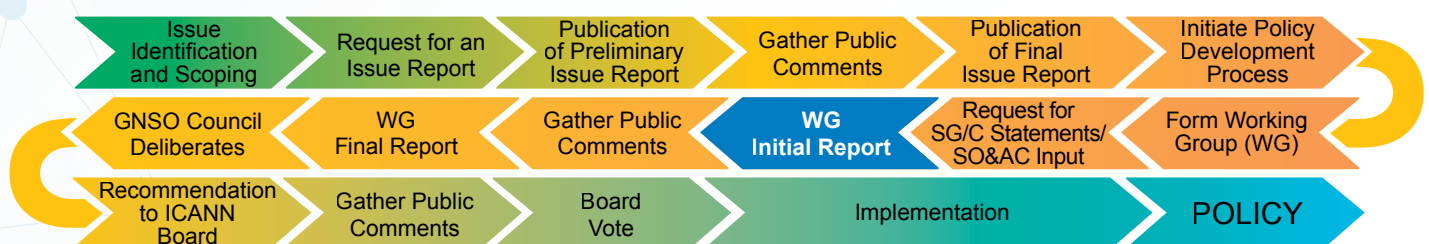
The Latin Script Diacritics (LD) Policy Development Process (PDP) Working Group (WG) will be holding two (2) working sessions at ICANN84. The working sessions are scheduled to take place on Saturday, 25 October from 10:30 to 12:00 and 13:15 to 14:30 Dublin local time, but please verify the [ICANN84 meeting schedule](#) for the confirmed times.

WHAT IS THIS ABOUT?

Diacritics are accents, accent marks, or acute accents that are used to modify sounds, or signify stressed syllables in many languages globally that utilize the Latin alphabet. The Domain Name System (DNS) is limited to the use of the American Standard Code for Information Interchange (ASCII) characters. However, the Domain Name System (DNS) does support Internationalized Domain Names (IDNs), including the usage of Latin alphabet-based characters with diacritics, with IDNs stored in the DNS as ASCII strings, relying upon Punycode transcription. As such, some users may elect to omit the diacritic marks instead of relying on an IDN.

During 2021–2024, the GNSO Council developed policy recommendations to define variant domain names at the top and second-level and to establish rules for variant management. However, there remained a gap in principles for cases where a base ASCII gTLD and its corresponding Latin diacritic gTLD(s) are not variants of each other.

Accordingly, the LD PDP examines the circumstance where a base ASCII gTLD and the Latin script diacritic version of the gTLD are not variants of each other. It is seeking to establish an appropriate mechanism where currently none exists that allows a single registry operator to simultaneously operate both gTLDs. The GNSO Council [initiated](#) a PDP for Latin Script Diacritics on 13 November 2024.



WHAT IS THE CURRENT STATUS OF THIS PROJECT?

The LD PDP WG is currently engaged in topic deliberations through its Charter questions. Concurrently, the WG is refining its preliminary recommendations to support the development of the Initial Report.

WHAT ARE THE EXPECTED NEXT STEPS?

Once the LD PDP WG concludes its deliberations, the next steps are to confirm its preliminary recommendations and publish its Initial Report for Public Comment.

HOW CAN I GET INVOLVED?

The LD PDP WG is structured as an Open Model, where it is open to all parties that are interested in participating. Other opportunities to participate in this topic will e through the Public Comment opportunities. For more information, please visit its [workspace](#).

Policy Development Process: Transfer Policy Review

WHAT CAN I EXPECT AT ICANN84 RELATED TO THIS TOPIC?

The working group will not hold a meeting at ICANN84.

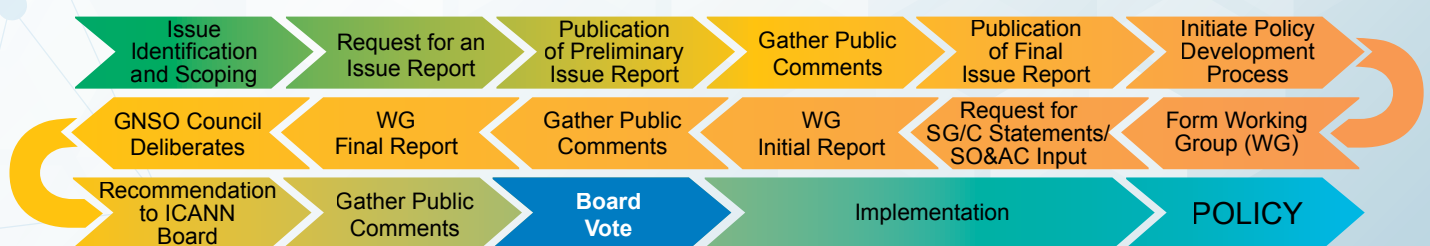
WHAT IS THIS ABOUT?

On 18 February 2021, the GNSO Council [initiated](#) a PDP to review the Transfer Policy, or the policy that describes the requirements for registrars when a registrant wishes to transfer their domain name(s) to a new registrar or registrant. This PDP is tasked to determine if changes to the policy are needed to improve the ease, security, and efficacy of inter-registrar and inter-registrant transfers.

WHAT IS THE CURRENT STATUS OF THIS PROJECT?

On 12 March 2025, the GNSO Council voted to [approve](#) all forty-seven (47) policy recommendations from the Transfer Policy Review Working Group's Final Report and voted to [approve](#) the Recommendations Report to the ICANN Board regarding the Final Recommendations from the Transfer Policy Review Policy Development Process Working Group on 10 April 2025.

The ICANN Board opened a [Public Comment](#) period on the Final Report, and the ICANN Community was invited to provide feedback. A [Summary Report](#) of the comments received was published on 2 July 2025.



WHAT ARE THE EXPECTED NEXT STEPS?

The ICANN Board will consider the Working Group's Final Report, including public comment received.

HOW CAN I GET INVOLVED?

The working group is no longer meeting, but interested parties may follow the progress of the Final Report by visiting the [PDP workspace](#) or provide [Public Comments](#) on the Final Report.

Expedited Policy Development Process: Internationalized Domain Names

WHAT CAN I EXPECT AT ICANN84 RELATED TO THIS TOPIC?

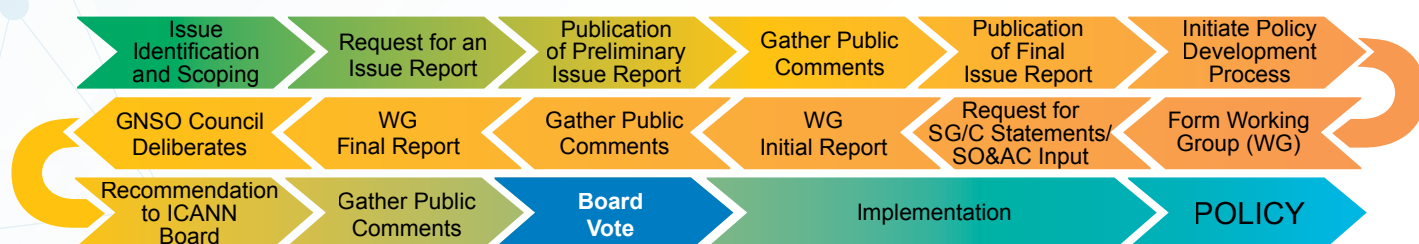
The Expedited Policy Development Process (EPDP) on Internationalized Domain Names (IDNs) Team (hereafter “the EPDP-IDNs Team”) will not hold a working session at ICANN84 as it has completed its work.

WHAT IS THIS ABOUT?

Domain names are mostly registered under the ASCII alphabet characters. As such, IDNs allow people to use domain names in their native languages and scripts, enabling the Internet to be more accessible to people who do not use ASCII. At the time, there was no accepted definition for variant TLDs nor a corresponding mechanism for “variant management.” The EPDP-IDNs set out to resolve these issues and on 20 May 2021 the GNSO Council approved the [initiation request](#) of the EPDP on IDNs and adopted its [charter](#).

Subsequently, the EPDP-IDNs Team bifurcated its work into two (2) phases to best prepare for the Next Round of the new gTLDs and avoid any potential delays that may affect the implementation work; Phase 1 focused on topics related to top-level gTLD definition and variant management, while Phase 2 focused on topics related to second-level variant management. The GNSO Council approved the [project change request](#) in November 2022.

Consequently, the GNSO Council [approved](#) the EPDP-IDNs [Phase 1 Final Report](#) on 21 December 2023, including all sixty-nine (69) Outputs, followed by the ICANN Board [adopting fifty-six \(56\) of the fifty-eight \(58\) final recommendations](#) by 7 September 2024. For Phase 2, the GNSO Council approved all twenty (20) Outputs (fourteen [14] recommendations, and six [6] implementation guidance) pertaining to second-level variant management documented in the [Phase 2 Final Report](#) on 13 November 2024, delivering the [Recommendations Report to the ICANN Board](#) in December 2024.



WHAT IS THE CURRENT STATUS OF THIS PROJECT?

The ICANN org is conducting its feasibility/impact analysis on Phase 2 policy recommendations to help the ICANN Board on its forthcoming decision.

The ICANN Board opened a [Public Comment](#) period on the EPDP-IDNs Phase 2 Final Report, where the ICANN community was invited to provide feedback. A [Summary Report](#) of the comments received was published on 18 February 2025.

WHAT ARE THE EXPECTED NEXT STEPS?

In accordance with the ICANN Bylaws, the ICANN Board is expected to take action on the Phase 2 policy recommendations, taking into account the Public Comments received.

HOW CAN I GET INVOLVED?

Since the EPDP-IDNs Team has now completed its work and the final Public Comment for Phase 2 organized by the ICANN Board is also closed, those interested in this topic are welcome to participate through anticipated IRT working sessions and/or other Public Comment opportunities led by the IRT.

Expedited Policy Development Process: Temporary Specification for gTLD Registration Data – Phase 2

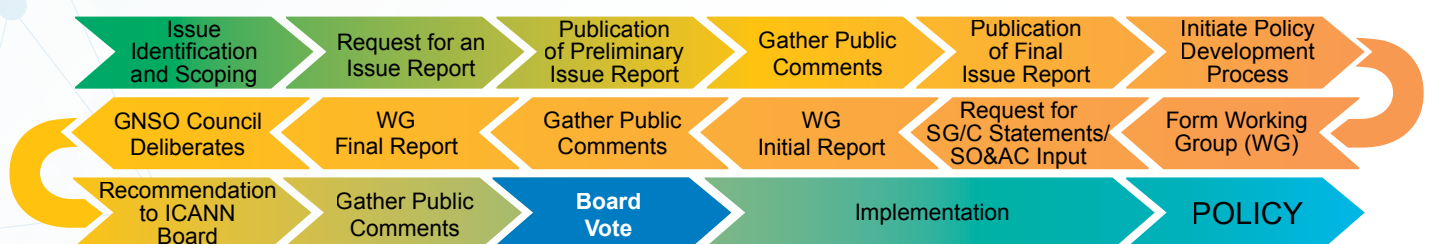
WHAT CAN I EXPECT AT ICANN84 RELATED TO THIS TOPIC?

The Registration Data Request Service (RDRS) Standing Committee (SC), the committee of volunteers charged with reviewing RDRS metrics and making recommendations to the GNSO Council, will hold four (4) working sessions during ICANN84. The Standing Committee has completed its draft Findings Report to the Council, which recently closed its [Public Comment](#). The Findings Report provides [six recommendations](#) to the GNSO Council on how to potentially proceed with the RDRS and the EPDP Phase2/ System for Standardized Access/Disclosure (SSAD) Recommendations based on almost two years of data review. The working sessions will focus on incorporating the Public Comments to the Findings Report and preparing the report for submission to the GNSO Council. The four (4) working sessions are scheduled to take place on Saturday, 25 October from 15:00 to 16:00 and 16:30 to 17:30; Sunday, 26 October from 16:30 to 17:30; and Wednesday, 29 October from 16:30 to 17:30 Dublin local time, but please verify the [ICANN84 meeting schedule](#) for the confirmed time.

WHAT IS THIS ABOUT?

The ICANN Board [directed](#) ICANN org in February 2023 to develop and launch the Whois Disclosure System (System), now called RDRS, as requested by the GNSO Council. In November 2023, the RDRS launched, and ICANN org began collecting and publishing the metrics associated with the System. In January 2024, ICANN released the [first RDRS metrics report](#).

One of the main purposes of the RDRS is to collect data about system usage, which will inform future discussions between the GNSO Council and the ICANN Board on the pending Recommendations 1–18 from the [Final Report](#) of the GNSO [Expedited Policy Development Process on the Temporary Specification for gTLD Registration Data Phase 2](#).



The RDRS was developed to provide insight into the estimated volume of requests a possible SSAD may receive. In addition, the RDRS may provide other information that helps determine the costs or benefits of the SSAD recommendations and whether the community may consider updates to the existing policy recommendations.

WHAT IS THE CURRENT STATUS OF THIS PROJECT?

During ICANN81, the RDRS SC agreed to start drafting its report that will be shared with the GNSO Council. In August 2025, the SC completed the drafting of its Findings Report, which has recently closed for [Public Comment](#). The Findings Report provides six recommendations to Council on how to potentially proceed with RDRS and the EPDP Phase2/ SSAD Recommendations. One of the recommendations is for the RDRS to continue while more policy work is underway.

WHAT ARE THE EXPECTED NEXT STEPS?

The working sessions at ICANN84 will focus on incorporating the Public Comments into the Findings Report and preparing the report for submission to the GNSO Council. Further engagement and consultation are expected to continue between the Board, the ICANN org, the GNSO Council, and the RDRS SC to collaborate on the review of the System.

Standing Committee: Standing Committee on Continuous Improvement

WHAT CAN I EXPECT AT ICANN84 RELATED TO THIS TOPIC?

The Standing Committee on Continuous Improvement (SCCI) will not be holding a meeting at ICANN84.

WHAT IS THIS ABOUT?

The SCCI was [convened](#) by the GNSO Council as a permanent committee on 13 November 2024 to oversee the implementation of continuous improvement-related projects that are focused on the GNSO's structural, procedural, and process improvements to the Policy Development Process (PDP). This is the outcome of a pilot framework known as the [Council Committee for Overseeing and Implementing Continuous Improvement \(CCOICI\)](#).

The GNSO Council has the responsibility of approving the SCCI's projects as well as its outcomes. The SCCI's remit does not include projects or topics that come within the scope of policy development, which must be handled through the GNSO's PDP. However, the SCCI's scope is not limited to the GNSO Council's work only and extends to the GNSO community. As necessary, the SCCI will carry out its work through dedicated task forces composed of GNSO Councilors and representatives from each GNSO Stakeholder Group and Constituency.

WHAT IS THE CURRENT STATUS OF THIS PROJECT?

The SCCI has completed initial deliberations regarding the Policy & Implementation (P&I) Policy Implementation Report (PSR) and is in the midst of preparing its recommendations report for the Council. It will next consider the GNSO's draft Continuous Improvement Program (CIP) Criteria. The Project Plan for 2025 and its corresponding assignment forms for CIP, P&I PSR, and PDP 3.0 were all [approved](#) by the GNSO Council on 10 April 2025.

WHAT ARE THE EXPECTED NEXT STEPS?

The SCCI will continue to develop preliminary recommendations for the GNSO Council on the P&I PSR and finalize the GNSO's CIP Criteria and Indicators now that more clarity is available regarding the overall CIP Framework.

HOW CAN I GET INVOLVED?

The SCCI is a standing committee sponsored by the Council. It is a representative model. All members will serve in representative capacity, where applicable, and as such, be responsible for consulting with their respective groups on a regular basis. Anyone interested may join as an observer.
